



#### **Director's Note:**

Doubt: A Parable is about doubt and the lack of certainty.

It has been a true pleasure working on this show. John Patrick Shanley is a genius with words, conflicts, and characterizations. The more we studied the script, the greater our appreciation of his talent grew. The lack of trust, the systematic oppression of women, the ambiguity of black and white, and the abuse by those in power are some of Shanley's themes where "doubt" is present.

Shanley was originally inspired to write this play, set in 1964, because of the United State's doubt about who killed Kennedy, the social changes taking place in the '60's, and the increasing awareness of sexual abuse in the Catholic church. Things haven't changed much; today the country is still in doubt about many issues including Iraq, Pakistan, health reform, Social Security, and even why the cost of gas goes up on the already- filled gas pumps the same day an increase in oil is announced.

A great deal of gratitude goes out to Mrs. Pat O'Brien, an actual Sister of Charity nun who graciously visited us from New York – thanks to my delightful neighbors, Maureen and Paul Stiller. The bond that evolved through e-mails helped guide us to an authentic pathway of art. The dedication of my cast as they went through this metamorphosis truly makes me proud.

Does "doubt" make someone weak or strong? Shanley shares, "Doubt is the sign of sophistication and strength." Shanley himself strongly states that the last act of the play takes place on the ride home after the show. I know some of you will want a definitive answer, but the playwright purposefully leaves it ambiguous because he wants the answer to come from the individual ... "Did he or didn't he? What do you think?"

#### WHO'S WHO IN CAST & CREW

She returned to Delaware in

2002 and reconnected with community theater, performing in *The Dinner Party*, *Cabaret* and *Chicago*. Susannah sells real estate for Long and Foster in Rehoboth Beach. She enjoys life at the beach with her family and friends and her menagerie of creatures including three pugs, two cats and a English Shepherd. She has loved the intensity (and fun!) of working on *Doubt: A Parable* and feels a special connection to the Sisters of Charity and especially former Sister Patricia O'Brien, who so generously shared her time and enthusiasm with all of us.



MICHAEL MURNIN (Fr. Flynn) – recently relocated to Delaware from New York City, where he acted and directed for On Wheels Productions, The Theatre Company, Broadway Arts Theatre for Young Audiences, The Roundabout Theatre Ensemble, Playwrights Horizons, Picture This, and the Westside Repertory Theatre, where he served as Artistic Director during four seasons.
